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1 THE CHAIRMAN: So I'm going to call the special meeting 2 of the Water Planning Council to order for 3 April 29th. There is one item on the agenda and 4 it's to look at our priorities as a Council. Of 5 course, we'll be meeting on Tuesday the 3rd as б well, but I thought this would kind of give us an 7 opportunity to just briefly see where we're at 8 from our own respective agencies.

I would like to thank Martin and Graham, and Lori and Denise Savageau for working to get the grant in on time, the grant application -- which was great.

And with that, why don't we start? Martin, why don't we start with you in terms of what you think we ought to be looking at, at this particular point in time?

Why don't you just tell us what you're 17 18 thinking of what are the things we ought to be 19 doing at this particular time? 20 MARTIN HEFT: Sure. So my thought process on this, as 21 we know -- (unintelligible) --22 THE CHAIRMAN: Hey, Martin --23 MARTIN HEFT: -- we do have an application 24 (unintelligible) the past couple of months, if you

will, and particularly -- yeah?

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1	THE CHAIRMAN: Martin, you're kind of coming in and
2	out. So why don't we come back to you?
3	MARTIN HEFT: Okay.
4	THE CHAIRMAN: We'll come back to you in a minute.
5	MARTIN HEFT: (Unintelligible) I'm almost home. So
6	let me just (inaudible).
7	THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. Why don't you come back on when
8	you're home?
9	Okay. Lori, would you like to?
10	LORI MATHIEU: Sure, Jack. Thank you. I think that
11	the last time we spoke of this I had brought up
12	the priorities that we had noted back in 2018, way
13	back when. And then the plan is passed, and since
14	that time we've done a lot of great work on
15	drought. We've done a lot of great work on water
16	conservation.
17	A few things from the Department of Public
18	Health's point of view is understanding water
19	quality and quantity impacts due to climate. And
20	that is directly connected with the GC3 work, and
21	also connected with the WUCC water supply planning
22	regional planning effort.
23	So understanding impacts of quality and
24	quantity due to climate, there there's a lot of
25	good information within our state water plan.

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But making sure that moving forward we have sufficient water supply, but that we can also provide a balance -- and that's what this plan is meant to do. Right? So overall, like a big picture.

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Another item which I know is really important to everybody is moving forward with more details on water conservation. And the idea of the fixtures, really looking at fixtures -- I know we've been working on that, but I want to continue our good work on that item. So quality, quantity, water conservation, water fixtures.

My other item that I bring up constantly is this, the ethic of water conservation and the two-day watering for irrigation, and that to sort of follow the lead of what Aquarion has been doing in many towns, which I think is a very good ethic to follow and how we can sort of stretch that out across our state. So it's just sort of following along on that water conservation ethic and keeping that moving forward.

There's a lot going on with infrastructure. Right? We all have a lot -- we have funding and it's so different and new -- just in November. Right?

So I think there should be some sort of effort there, but I'm not quite sure. It is a priority. It's a priority of everyone who has those pots of money. And so within our group we have the drinking water SRF, and I think that that's going to continue to be highlighted over the next many years. So you know infrastructure, infrastructure funding.

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And as a matter of fact, I'm just looking at some of the key findings in our little one-pager, and some of the topmost important items that we thought were really important were these, some of the basins. And I know this is outside of our lane in the Health Department, but looking at some of the basins that are stressed, and are there still some that are out there that go dry?

And I think of the Quinnipiac.

And also it dovetails with the idea of quality and quality, because there's a lot of public water supplies within that basin, and it serves a big population in a central core of our state. And it sort of dovetails with the idea of understanding the quantity of water.

And when the quantity starts to go down and that river dries up, what happens to the quality

of that water?

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2 So for me those are the things that I'd like 3 to focus on. I think those are priorities 4 definitely for the Department, water quality and 5 quantity, water conservation, fixtures, irrigation б and the bill, the infrastructure, the bipartisan 7 infrastructure funding that's coming our way. 8 The last thing I'll add is source protection, 9 which we're already working on and it's already 10 been a priority of the subgroups and the watershed 11 team that we have working on it, but I think we 12 never want to forget about protecting sources of 13 water. That's it, Jack. 14 THE CHAIRMAN: No -- and that's a lot. 15 Martin is back. So why don't we go over to 16 Martin? 17 MARTIN HEFT: Sure. 18 Thank you, Lori. I think those are THE CHAIRMAN: 19 really great areas. I mean, I know we really 20 wanted to get moving on the fixtures and water 21 conservation, but it was a short session. And 22 Graham and you -- we had to have some dialogue 23 with the appropriate agencies, but it will be 24 priority for next year, for sure. 25 Martin?

MARTIN HEFT: Sure. And thank you.

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Apologies for earlier. I was going through a dead zone driving, and so I kind of cut out. But I was able to hear all of Lori's comments. And so I appreciate those.

So yeah. As I started saying earlier, as you know, we have the application in for the state water plan for kind of an update of that. We've talked about a couple larger items over the past couple of months. And I think really for a focus for the Water Planning Council as looking at goals -- is really that our main goal is a five-year update to the state water plan for that.

Whether it be through the federal funding, or we propose funding in the next biennial budget; to make sure that happens statutorily, that's our requirement to do for that. So we do have the statutory background, the legislative piece that allows us to do that.

Of course, we've got to have the funding there for it. We've also discussed about making sure that we have a budget. So I think those are two big items that we have to do as our goals.

I think a lot of the other things of looking at those items, as Lori started saying, those are all going to become part of the updated water plan.

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3 You know those are the specifics of it. 4 Personally I'd rather see us say, okay. These are 5 our two main focuses; we're going to update the б state water plan, which is going to encompass all 7 these other smaller priorities, if you will, and 8 not to minimize them at all on that; as well as 9 doing a budget for the Council itself; and that 10 those should be our main priorities. 11

We know these other pieces are going to fall into it as we progress and go through, because that's going to be part of that whole planning at the end process of everything.

So that would be my recommendations.
 THE CHAIRMAN: And they're good ones. I mean, we're
 making progress with the funding.

I should say that Martin and I spoke, and that we had talked about using WICA funds. It would be difficult for us to use WICA funds because the way the statutes are written, it's really under the auspices funding under OPM.

And so it would be a challenge for us to do that, but I do have -- again, I know we'd like to get some money for at least the twelve months

1 beginning July 1 of 2022, through June 30, 2023. 2 I do have some ideas still -- but I don't want to 3 share them just this second until I talk with my 4 Chair again on Monday and see if it's something 5 realistically we can do. б So Martin, thank you again for all of your 7 work on this. 8 And no update on the bonding money? 9 MARTIN HEFT: No, and unfortunately because of we're 10 trying to get the budget implementor stuff done 11 and everything, the staff that would look into 12 that is all tied up right now, so. 13 THE CHAIRMAN: All right. Understood. Okay. 14 Thank you. 15 Graham? Graham is in the office today. 16 GRAHAM STEVENS: I'm in the office. 17 How are you, Chairman? I'm doing well. 18 THE CHAIRMAN: 19 Good. So the way we've looked at our **GRAHAM STEVENS:** 20 list before of the priorities that were in the 21 previous, that were previously pulled from the 22 state water plan and used for prioritization 23 purposes. 24 And the way that I'm looking at this is, what 25 should we be focusing on as a Council for the next three to five years? And I kind of put it into four buckets; one is strategic action, one is data, one is water protection, and the last is overarching lenses through which we should analyze all of our actions.

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So under strategic actions I think we've all agreed we need to hire a water chief. We need to monitor and plan. Monitor for plan implementation, which is a big part of what the water chief is going to be doing.

And we need to continue our efforts, which has been really spearheaded by our amazing stakeholder and volunteer groups on education and outreach. So those are really our strategic actions.

And then with respect to data, you know I think it's important to really double down and find better and more sustainable funding for USGS monitoring. They do a lot for us. We rely on the information that they collect to the benefit of everyone, whether that be water companies, DEEP, DPH, you know, PURA, or OPM or others. Right?

So they kind of are a partner here -- and maybe aren't at our meetings, but a lot of what they do is kind of the backbone for information

that we utilize.

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And then water protection; we definitely need to take further steps in the short term on water conservation. And then also -- and this is a broad group of actions and not, like Martin said, not meant to minimize them -- but source water protection. I think there's seven or eight things that we have on this previous list that fall under that category.

And then the lenses by which I think we should be looking at all of these are, of course, climate change, environmental equity and health equity.

And if we focus and are able to accomplish actions under those, under those points in the next three to five years I think we're going to be doing amazing work for the State of Connecticut, and for all the various stakeholders who are interested in its waters, and who use its waters.

And so that's the way I've been looking at this, but I have agreed with everything that everyone here has said thus far. And it doesn't seem that we're really that far apart. I think we kind of share similar opinions.

²⁵ THE CHAIRMAN: I agree with that. And of course, my

priority is always to look at how we're going to get some money and working with our sister agencies to do that. And we're kind of -- as the financial regulator we're in somewhat of a position to do that and spear that.

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You know we did -- for example, when we did the conservation workshop we did during a rate case -- I'm sorry, during a merger -- get some funds from Connecticut Water. And I believe that they paid our consultants for that directly.

And I just have to study the mechanics of that moving forward seeing if we might be able to replicate that. And it won't be a whole -- when you look at the number of water customers we have in the state of Connecticut, you're looking at a whole lot of money. So stay tuned with that.

Now I'm going to open it up to the -LORI MATHIEU: Jack, just listening to Martin and
Graham and yourself -- so there's some buckets, as
Graham laid it out into these buckets. You know
there's the administrative functions that we need.
You know there's the money. We need to pursue
funding, and we're doing that.

Those are important items -- and to be able to find the funding the hire a chief. Right? To help us as it was envisioned in the plan. I see those as administrative function, and those are priorities because we can't do anything else. Without it we're really going to struggle.

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But then there are the action items implementation topics, the keys of what we need to narrow ourselves and our focus in on for year one, year two, over a five-year period of time.

So I think it's worth maybe in a different meeting talking about the details of sort of breaking it out and writing it down for ourselves so that we can nail down what we want to do over the next twelve months. What's important to do over the next twelve months for implementation items and administrative function?

Because we have a lot going on. You know there's a lot of balls in the air right now, and we've got to keep track of it all. So I think it would be helpful to us to sort of map that out so that we have a pathway forward.

THE CHAIRMAN: Yes, and we've got a chat -- I don't know if you all got the same chat I got from Virginia -- about the account modeling that was started in the plan, that they could have formed quantity questions as well as climate change,

which is something -- I mean, in this process -which you're absolutely correct, and it's a good recommendation moving forward.

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I mean, our Water Planning Council advisory group and the implementation workgroup have been phenomenal in terms of helping us push things through. Our drought plan with Martin's leadership is coming together.

But to your point, I think -- and we'll have a meeting Tuesday -- is that we ought to categorize these, all these things we're talking about this afternoon, and goals and objectives and timeframes moving forward. So when we meet on a regular basis we could check off the box and see where we're at.

So I think it's a good suggestion, Lori.

I'm going to open it -- because on the agenda, I am going to open it up to the public if anybody wants to say anything.

(No response.)

LORI MATHIEU: Are there people on, Jack?
 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes. Yeah.

²⁵ DAVID KUZMINSKI: This is David. Jack, everybody else,

1	I just want to thank you guys for continuing to			
2	this is going to sound corny but prioritize			
3	prioritization.			
4	THE CHAIRMAN: No, it doesn't.			
5	DAVID KUZMINSKI: Because we need some direction, and			
6	whatever you collectively wish us to take on,			
7	we're happy to do it.			
8	THE CHAIRMAN: David, I don't think it sounds corny at			
9	all because you know it's what we're trying to do.			
10	And it's getting our collective minds			
11	together and the support we have from our			
12	collective agencies together. And I'm very			
13	excited and optimistic about the whole budgetary			
14	process. If this all comes together July 1 in			
15	2023, we're going to be in really good shape I			
16	think.			
17	But in the meantime we have to keep the buses			
18	online. And to Lori's point, that's why we have			
19	to always kind of relook and reevaluate moving			
20	forward.			
21	So thank you, David.

1 I know that we all have time constraints THE CHAIRMAN: 2 today. I'm glad we got this in, because I think 3 it's important. 4 And we have Rob our transcriber pulling into 5 a parking lot taking the minutes today, and Martin б driving. So we appreciate everybody. 7 But to David's point, even though we keep on 8 meeting like this, we have to keep it front and 9 center. 10 And I can't believe when I looked at the 11 calendar, the fact we have to come up with an 12 update and we have to go and market this again at 13 the State Capitol and tell whoever takes over the 14 various committees next year what a great job the 15 Water Planning Council is doing. 16 So any closing comments? Graham? Lori? 17 Martin? VIRGINIA de LIMA: Jack, I'm not Graham, Lori or 18 19 Martin -- but I have a comment. What is your 20 process from here? 21 We've have heard a lot of great suggestions 22 from each of the four agencies. What are you four 23 going to do with those suggestions and how then 24 will priorities be communicated to the 25 implementation workgroup?

1	THE CHAIRMAN: I think any of my Martin or Graham,
2	or Lori can jump in here. I mean, my thinking is
3	we're going to look at what we come up with today,
4	check the transcript, look at what Rob has
5	recorded.
б	And then the way I'm understanding it, to
7	Lori's point is that we will, maybe as early
8	as hopefully, by Tuesday's meeting we'll have
9	some items that we can discuss at Tuesday's
10	meeting moving forward, which may very well
11	include giving you, giving your workgroup some
12	assignments.
13	VIRGINIA de LIMA: Well, that's excellent. Thank you.
14	(Interruption.)
15	THE CHAIRMAN: Lori?
16	GRAHAM STEVENS: Lori is getting called by somebody.
17	LORI MATHIEU: I have to run. All right.
18	THE CHAIRMAN: Lori, that's okay. Bye-bye. Thank you.
19	Graham, are you okay with that?
20	GRAHAM STEVENS: Yeah, absolutely. I think that's a
21	great approach. And I don't want to hold off
22	until we have the water chief but I mean, I
23	feel like things will flow more smoothly once we
24	do.
25	But I think based on the transcript, and

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based on the conversation today we can probably put together a short document with just some guiding priorities and principles that will help hopefully folks focus efforts.

And then once we do have the water chief on board, you know it would be great to really just start developing a workplan for all of those individual priorities, and to look at all of the work that the Water Planning Council advisory group is doing, the implementation workgroup is doing; seeing how it feeds into that prioritization scheme and make sure that we're making progress towards improvements for Connecticut's water.

So I'm pretty hopeful. It didn't seem like there was anything that was misaligned, or anyone who really felt strongly or differently. I took some notes today as well and I look forward to the transcript, and we can put something together that hopefully we can discuss further on Tuesday.

21 **THE CHAIRMAN: Great.**

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22 **GRAHAM STEVENS:** It's progress.

23 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you very much.

Do you have any closing comments, Martin?
 MARTIN HEFT: Perfect, Jack. Thank you.

1 And appreciate, Graham, Lori, and Jack, all 2 your comments and everything because I think we 3 are all on the same page, and you know that path 4 forward is our plan of what we've got to do. 5 The only other thing I'd suggest as we're б doing the plan is to actually add in a timeline of 7 the plan for that implementation piece of it. So 8 we do that five-year timeline, once we kind of get 9 the priorities done, that we have that as also a 10 piece of our overall plan. 11 THE CHAIRMAN: Exactly. That's a very good point. 12 Thank you. 13 Rob, no pressure, but when do you think you 14 can have this transcript? 15 This isn't very long. I could probably THE REPORTER: 16 have it done, on the road -- send it in today if 17 you'd like. It's only 22 pages. 18 THE CHAIRMAN: Yeah, Monday is fine actually -- but 19 that's fine. Thank you, Rob. 20 GRAHAM STEVENS: Yeah, Monday works. 21 THE CHAIRMAN: That works for us. 22 All right. Anything else to come before us? 23 24 (No response.) 25
