5	6th. I'm Jack Betkoski, Chair of the Water			
6	Planning Council.			
7	The first order of business will be the			
8	approval of the July 2, 2024 transcript.			
9	MARTIN HEFT: So moved.			
10	THE CHAIRMAN: Made. Second, Eric?			
11	ERIC McPHEE: Second.			
12	THE CHAIRMAN: Any questions on the motion?

18	THE COUNCIL: Aye.			
19	THE CHAIRMAN: The transcript is approved.			
20	Public comment on the agenda as you can			
21	see we're going to be having the election of			
22	chairman. I think some of you have probably heard			
23	that the beginning of next year I will be retiring			
24				
	from state service, but I'll be around for the			

1 formal goodbyes later on this year. 2 But with that, we still -- let me say, are 3 there any other public comments before we go to 4 the first agenda item? 5 We did not elect a chair and we have to do 6 that pursuant to Statute 25-330. 7 But is there any public comment on any other 8 agenda items? 9 10 (No response.) 11 12 If not, we'll move on to the first order THE CHAIRMAN: 13 of business, which is the election of a chairman 14 pursuant to Statute 25-330. Do I hear a motion? 15 MARTIN HEFT: Mr. Chair, I would like to move that we 16 appoint yourself, Jack Betkoski, as Chairman 17 pursuant to Connecticut General Statutes Section 18 25-330 for this upcoming year that effectively 19 began in July of this year. 20 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you very much. 21 Second? 22 ERIC McPHEE: Second. 23 THE CHAIRMAN: Any questions on motion? 24 25 (No response.)

4	THE CHAIRMAN: The motion is approved. Thank you very		
5	much, and I look forward to serving the next		
6	several months, and we'll more than likely have ar		
7	election in December to elect a successor.		
8	Moving right along on to workgroup reports,		
9	advisor group. Alicea and Dan?		
10	ALICEA CHARAMUT: So can someone can I share here?		
11	Oh, I can share. Somebody has already given		
12	permission. Okay.		
13	I apologize for being off camera, but I'm		
14	feeling under the weather today, so I don't want		
15	to look at myself looking like this. It's going		
16	to make me feel worse.		
17	THE CHAIRMAN: That's quite right.		
18	We appreciate you being with us, Alicea.		
19	ALICEA CHARAMUT: Let's see. I'm trying to get		
20	okay.		
21	So oh, I don't know how to get rid of the		
22	notes. You'll just have to look at it this way.		
23	I apologize.		
24	So we were asked by the Water Planning		
25	Council by the way, all of these are pieces of		

the report that I sent to you guys this afternoon so that everybody can see what was sent out.

So we were asked by you guys to take a look at the existing workgroups to review them and make recommendations to the Water Planning Council as to the relevance/relevancy of the existing groups and their reporting structures.

So just a little bit of background. This is the language that established the Water Planning Council, which is Section 25a-330. And also, I included a reference to our own guidelines and operating procedures, and how our workgroups are established.

So at our July 16th meeting, we discussed the relevance category and reporting structure for our workgroups and we're making the following recommendations.

Definitions, you know, we felt like we needed to define. And as far as standing committees or workgroups go, obviously, these are our ongoing workgroups that either provide some sort of administrative support or an ongoing water resource issue, or an ongoing activity such as the outreach and education workgroup.

And so the standing groups that we had

L7	THE CHAIRMAN: No worries. I'm glad to have you.			
L8	ALICEA CHARAMUT: This is not your day, Graham.			
L9	GRAHAM STEVENS: No, no. Yes, I've been having			
20	technical difficulties all day, as Alicea well			
21	knows.			
22	THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. Alicea, please continue.			
23	Thank you.			
24	ALICEA CHARAMUT: So these are the current standing			
25	committees or workgroups, which is the WPCAG			

nominating committee; the annual report workgroup, which we almost forgot about because they're only utilized once a year; the watershed lands group and the outreach and education committee.

Topical workgroups we defined as groups that are formed to research and report on very specific topics that exist for a finite period of time.

And the current topical workgroups are the source water protection white paper workgroup and the conservation pricing and recovery analysis workgroup.

So we talked about the relevancy of all of the existing groups that are currently -- or current existing groups, and it was a consensus of the water planning advisory group that all current standing and topical workgroups are valuable and necessary. And there was also a desire to also explore other topics that are relevant and that are priorities.

So I created this sort of little flow chart here. So we -- the annual report workgroup, we saw as an administrative function of the Water Planning Council. Right? Because they exist to help meet the statutory requirement to report to the Legislature.

And also the outreach and education workgroup is also an arm of the Water Planning Council in that they, you know, support the work of the Water Planning Council and water planning in general in doing that outreach and education, but are tightly connected with the Water Planning Council advisory group because the water planning advisory group provides the broad stakeholder resources and feedback that is valuable in the work that they both do. And of course, the annual report workgroup reports on the activities of those groups. So they do have a link.

And then the nominating committee, the topical workgroups, and the watershed lands group fall under the Water Planning Council advisory.

Does anybody have any questions about that?

(No response.)

ALICEA CHARAMUT: All right. We also talked a little bit about the importance of transparency and document retention. You know, when these groups are formed, you know, we often have to sort of go back and say, well, you know, what was our purpose? And what's our scope again, you know,

after you've been working for a few months, kind of, doing your reality checks?

And the topical workgroups have been submitting proposals to the Water Planning Council that get approved by the Water Planning Council, and those are sort of like a founding document for these groups. And the work that the folks that are doing on the website is going to help a lot with that transparency and document retention.

Because for the longest time -- at least, you know, who knows what it was like before, you know, even, you know, electronic documents were the standard, you know? But now there's too many reports and documents and other things that live on people's hard drives. And if they go away or retire, we never see them again, and sometimes those things go with them.

So being able to utilize the website as a place, not only where the public can access a lot of these documents and historical information and data, it's also important for those of us that are working on it to be able to access those things. So that's going to be really helpful.

Because you know one of the things that was pointed out is, who has all of the workgroup

proposals? So you know, having those on the web/website are really helpful.

So those are our recommendations, and I can -- since this is sort of like the central visual, I'll leave it there.

And does anyone have any questions? Feedback?

THE CHAIRMAN: I'd just like to say I think you did a great job outlining it and what we do, and what we're going to be doing in the future, and have come up with a great way to maintain the appropriate and accurate recordkeeping as we move on. So thank you very much for this.

Anyone else have any?

ERIC McPHEE: I'm just wondering if, Alicea, is it valuable to sort of add some sort of symbol denoting whether something was, you know, driven by the Council, driven by statute, or driven by committee?

And you know, if there was a report that was drafted, if it's worthwhile, you know, from a recordkeeping perspective to sort of differentiate the different drivers of that?

ALICEA CHARAMUT: Well, those are usually within the -I mean, I guess I could do it here, but as far as

1 things like the workgroups that are established, 2 those are usually within those workgroup 3 proposals. There was a sort of a background on 4 that as to how they were, what they were born out 5 of, you know, what discretion. 6 As far as some of the standing groups --7 DAN LAWRENCE: Alicia, it's Dan. 8 ALICEA CHARAMUT: Yeah, go ahead. 9 DAN LAWRENCE: I just had a question for Eric. 10 ALICEA CHARAMUT: Yeah? 11 DAN LAWRENCE: So, Eric, you're talking about in terms 12 of reference purposes just so that if you're 13 looking back and you wanted to figure out 14 something quickly? 15 That was your question -- or is it? 16 ERIC McPHEE: I think just, yeah, from a matter of 17 record perspective. You know, if we're going back 18 a few years, we want to know --19 DAN LAWRENCE: Right, where. 20 ERIC McPHEE: -- the recordkeeping perspective, what 21 the driver was for anything that was, you know, 22 any work that was produced, it would seem. 23 DAN LAWRENCE: So you could -- I think the easiest way 24 to do it is create some sort of -- right? 25 file or some sort of table that you can track

1 everything -- right? With the name of it, who was 2 in it, and, you know, who drove it and where it 3 ended. 4 Alicea, what do you think of that? 5 ALICEA CHARAMUT: You know, I do -- thank you for 6 bringing that up, because I think we talked about 7 that at the advisory group meeting. 8 DAN LAWRENCE: Uh-huh. 9 ALICEA CHARAMUT: And it just didn't end up in my 10 notes. 11 DAN LAWRENCE: Yeah. 12 ALICEA CHARAMUT: But yeah, someone did suggest some 13 sort of, like, a table. 14 DAN LAWRENCE: Like a creeper for links on it, a table 15 that makes up hyperlinks. Hyperlinks, yeah. 16 ALICEA CHARAMUT: Yeah, a table that shows just sort of the summary of all of them, or at least a link to 17 18 the document that, you know, the establishing 19 document. 20 ERIC McPHEE: Right. And with all the digital 21 recordkeeping now, all the metadata, you know they 22 have different categories for how you can refer 23 back to it. 24 ALICEA CHARAMUT: That's above my pay grade. 25 DAN LAWRENCE: Probably mine too, but we can get

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someone to do that and help us. But yeah, so we can create a table, you know, that basically summarizes that for simplicity. Right? And bring that back for everyone to see and comment on.

THE CHAIRMAN: That sounds good.

Any other comment or suggestions from the Council?

I see Virginia.

MARTIN HEFT: One second, Jack. Sorry.

THE CHAIRMAN: I'm sorry, Martin.

MARTIN HEFT: No, it's okay. No problem. I had to take a phone call. Apologies.

I just want to thank the committee. attended the -- well, the first part of their meeting when they started discussing this just to kind of help do an overview. And I really appreciate just going through taking the time to analyze this and kind of coming up with this chart and everything else on this.

And I do agree, and I apologize if I repeat something that was said -- because as I said, I had to jump off on a call -- that I think having that structure, as you said, it's like when the proposal is there also, like, following up, you know, when that topical group is ended, that

there's a closeout procedure and everything else. So you kind of have it from start to end, and that there's some sort of tracking there -- that that happens.

And we know we've done that. You know we kind of have that proposal set up that we've done, you know, previously for, you know, a new topical workgroup with the elements that, you know, we've asked for it to be in there.

And then just kind of a followup saying, you know, whether it's, here's the final report; this topical workgroup is now done, or whatever else that, you know, we just have that from, you know, A to Z on there.

So I think that's an important piece, too.

So I just want to thank the committee with that.

And I like the little flow chart here. I think that's very good and helpful for us for moving forward.

Thanks, Jack.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you very much.

Any other questions or comments from councilmembers? Virginia?

ERIC McPHEE: I guess this just -- oh, I'm sorry.

THE CHAIRMAN: Oh, I'm sorry.

ERIC McPHEE: No, no.

2 THE CHAIRMAN: Go ahead, Eric.

ERIC McPHEE: Go ahead, Virginia.

VIRGINIA de LIMA: I just have a few comments. One of the things that came up in this discussion was talking about the website and having a repository for documents and things like that.

And it occurred to me that we have -- the website group started out as part of the education and outreach group. And currently, my understanding is it's mostly agency folks. I don't know if that's what people -- how people want to keep it, but it might be something that would be appropriately on this flow chart with the annual report workgroup as a standing committee that was reporting directly to the Water Planning Council, because it was -- it is sort of an administrative function.

So I was -- I had several points, but that was one of them that I don't know how you would like to see that handled.

MARTIN HEFT: Yeah. Personally, I don't think it's needed. We have agency staff that handle the website. They're the ones who are authorized that way. And as long as, you know, and that's part of

we have agency staff that are on all of the workgroups and everything to make sure that things are updated in that way.

So I think we're covered in that. I don't believe it needs a separate workgroup or, you know, anything in that nature.

VIRGINIA de LIMA: Okay. Thank you for that.

A couple of other comments. In terms of the closeout procedures that Martin mentioned, I think that's essential that we have those kinds of closeout procedures. And that actually fits very nicely into a summary that would be part of the annual report.

You also mentioned having a following up on Eric's comment. You mentioned having sort of a conglomeration, a table, if you will, of all the things historically that happened. I could envision that sort of being a mega annual report, wherein the annual reports for each of the years were eventually glommed together into a single place, a single table, a single report that included that historical stuff.

Again, that would be very simple to do just by, you know, cutting and pasting the historical stuff into the current document and having that be

your archive. So that's just another thing that that you might want to consider doing.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Virginia.

VIRGINIA de LIMA: And one more thing I just want to point out that with the annual report workgroup, that historically has had two flavors. There clearly is the administrative role that's indicated here of doing it every year to meet the requirements from the Legislature.

We also had originally thought of it as a group that explored the various options of how to do a more fully electronic annual report so that in the ideal, it would come down to pushing a button and it would create itself automatically. And there was some initial work done of how other organizations have handled putting together such a document. I believe one of the nicest versions was something that the EPA Long Island Sound study was doing, and I don't know if that's something that we want.

I would not like to lose that effort to keep in touch with keeping with -- to keep on top of what the electronics available and useful it might be, and whether that's appropriately left to the administrative, the more administrative group

1	that's doing it every year, or whether that's	
2	something that might in the future warrant a	
3	special look.	
4	GRAHAM STEVENS: Thanks, Virginia. We certainly, you	
5	know, share your desire to utilize technology to	
6	make everyone's life better and hopefully not more	
7	complicated, like it sometimes can do	
8	particularly when you can't get onto a Zoom	
9	meeting because you have the wrong Zoom link.	
10	Some days are better than others, but yeah, I	
11	totally see the value in not forgetting a lot of	
12	the great works that many of you do throughout the	
13	year so that that's adequately captured, and	
14	easily captured in the annual report.	
15	Thank you.	
16	THE CHAIRMAN: Any other comments?	
17	Martin, Eric?

21	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Virginia.	
22	Alicea, are we all set? Any other comments?	
23	Nice job.	
24	Or David, Dan, any other comments?	
25	DAN LAWRENCE: No, I'm good right now. Thank you.	

THE CHAIRMAN: Alicea, all set?

ALICEA CHARAMUT: Yeah. Sorry. Something froze up on my computer, so I had to stop sharing, but apparently that wasn't a problem, so.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. All right, we are moving on to Denise Savageau. Good afternoon.

DENISE SAVAGEAU: Hi, good afternoon.

So, the Outreach and Education Committee continues to do its work. As we reported last time, we are looking in the fall of having two workshops continuing with our 2024 theme of source water protection and the celebration of the Safe Drinking Water Act, as well as the aquifer protection regulations.

I'm just going to quickly share my screen, hopefully. Shortly, the save the date will be going out, and the save the date is for September 24th, from twelve to one. We'll be talking about the Safe Drinking Water Act.

Kira Jacobs with EPA, the Drinking Water
Division, Region 1, will be just doing a quick
overview of that. And then Pat Bisacky from the
Department of Public Health will be talking about
PFAS. And then we've got Iris Kaminski from Yale
will be talking about 1,4-dioxane. So, we'll be

getting into those emerging contaminants.

We now have that agenda set. So I gave you the names, which isn't in the save the date, but we will be getting out the registration information right after Labor Day. The save the date will be going out in the next day or so.

And then we also are looking to do on October 17th, it's Imagine a Day Without Water. And we've been participating in that annually, as most people remember. And it's actually the 10th anniversary of the Imagine a Day Without Water Program, and we're going to be focusing on flash drought.

And we've been talking to Eric Lindquist at the Department of Public Health about that. We haven't confirmed all the speakers yet, but we'll, again, we'll probably -- by September 24th, we'll also then have the registration materials out for the Imagine a Day Without Water information.

So, I'll stop sharing that.

And just as a followup -- so that that's going to be wrapping up our programs for this year. And -- but we're starting to think about what our theme is for 2025. So if anybody has a theme for 2025, you can share that with us. I

know last time, you know, it was brought up that it was the 50th anniversary of the Safe Drinking Water Act. So certainly, we piggybacked on that.

So we're looking to see if there are any other celebrations or anything we need to be looking at, but we will be taking that into consideration in our September meeting, and then bringing recommendations forward for programming to you, like we usually do in October, for the 2025 year. So that's kind of the outreach piece of it -- or I should say the education piece.

A couple of things we're also working on and we reported last time is that we're looking at the state water plan and seeing how we can start making sure that we're capturing everybody who's working on the state water plan.

It's not, you know, just the agencies that are working on it. The water utilities are working on it. Municipalities are working on it. There's a whole lot of folks, you know, NGOs are working on it. There's a whole lot of people that work on all of the tasks that need to be done, and we're looking at identifying those.

So we have a team led by Kim Czapla who's looking at how to collect data on who's doing

what, and with a survey. And then we're also
looking at developing this, as we had mentioned
before, a state water plan's, you know, steward.

You know, who are the stewards of our state water
plan besides the, you know, the agencies? And so
we're looking at developing that. So we have a

team.

So we're really excited about this, and stay tuned as we develop that, and we'll be presenting more information on that.

Just quickly, the last couple of items is the website. We always talk about the website. And the website, I have to say kudos -- this is one of the reasons I wanted to bring it up to Allie Hibbard, because she now has all of the workshops that we had done previously up on the website.

So all the workshops that we have done to date as part of this outreach and education workgroup are now up on the website. So you can see all those presentations, really a good amount of presentations.

And we're looking to see if we can get these into some kind of playlist and we're trying to figure that out, but right now, they're all up on the outreach and education website. So we

continue to see what we need happening with the website.

And as was alluded to previously, obviously, that's an internal with the folks who are doing the actual physical work, but we have opened that up. That if there's a need for us to do more assessment or to give more input on that, you know, that it's one of the things the outreach and education group kind of keeps an eye on with the folks who are doing this.

Is there stuff we can help you with? Is there stuff you want us to assess? Do you want us to give you feedback on that? So we continue to look at that, because it's an important piece of what we do from an education and outreach perspective.

And then just the last thing is our next meeting is normally September 3rd. That's the first Tuesday of the month. We're not sure if we're going to change that yet, so stay tuned. We may be moving that to September 10th.

We did have some conflicts with some members, but we're trying to get a feel for who can attend the 3rd or who can attend the 10th, and we will let you know, you know, as soon as we have that

date set when the date of our next meeting is.

And that, that's our report for today.

THE CHAIRMAN: Great report, as usual, Denise.

Any questions or comments for Denise?

Lots of great activities coming up.

MARTIN HEFT: Yeah, Jack, I do.

THE CHAIRMAN: Yes?

MARTIN HEFT: Denise, thank you for all of that.

A couple of things just as, you know, we do
this as a reminder, you know, that you know -- and
I appreciate all the work and everything that's
being done here and everything, but a flyer and
everything shouldn't, you know, be -- I know it
hasn't probably been sent out yet, everything, but
it should get approved by the Water Planning
Council before we send stuff out as if we're the
sponsor of this.

You know this is through the Water Planning Council, and the state water plan is that, you know, flyer, save the dates, all of that stuff should be approved by the Council before they are sent out. So I'd appreciate that, you know, moving forward on that.

And then the second item is -- as I've asked in the past, and haven't gotten any feedback or

anything on it -- on the October 17th regarding the drought and everything. I know as Chair of the interagency drought workgroup, you know, we haven't been reached out to yet for that.

And I know it's still early, but I know if planning is going forward and everything on that, you know, appreciate that the interagency drought workgroup that, you know, is somewhat involved in that -- or at least review what's going on since that's our role.

Thank you.

DENISE SAVAGEAU: Okay. So just a couple of responses.

I'm more than happy to do that. Obviously, with all of the flyers over the past three years, we have not had to save the date because we have agency people on our committee.

But that said, if you want to start approving the flyers, we can certainly do that. It would -- I would think it would, if this works for you, I'm hoping that we can send them to you and then give you a turnaround time on them. Because if we have to have them a whole month ahead on a save the date, we're not going to get them out soon enough.

But the folks who are on, you know, the committee, if you don't have somebody right now on

the committee, we'd love to have somebody on the outreach and education committee from every single one of the board members.

In terms of the drought, we have -- we actually had discussions, and Allie Hibbard was in communication with Becca. And Becca has -- so we were talking about making sure that Becca is in the loop on all the work we're doing. And so that will definitely happen.

So that's something that -- and she is, I think, on the list for the education and outreach. I'm not sure if she usually attends, but she is on our list right now. Of course, it was Eric Lindquist until he switched gears and went over to DPH, but we would love to again have somebody.

But the agency people who are helping develop all the materials, Kim Czapla, Allie Hibbard, Allie Ayotte, these are all people who have approved of this. So basically, the only, you know, the only person who's not on our committee right now is OPM. So we'd love to have OPM on that as well.

MARTIN HEFT: Well, just so you know, Becca is OPM.

DENISE SAVAGEAU: Yes, I know. But if she's not

attending -- I'm just saying that's if she

1 attends --MARTIN HEFT: No, but I know. But --2 3 DENISE SAVAGEAU: -- then we would have that. 4 MARTIN HEFT: I appreciate that, Denise. I do, you 5 know, I appreciate that. Even though we have 6 agency reps on, they are not the voting members of 7 the Water Planning Council. 8 And that's why I'm saying, you know, some of 9 this, you know, where we have, you know, the flyer 10 shows the state water plan logo. Should it also 11 have the State Water Planning Council logo? 12 You know, minor things like that, you know, 13 where it says, hosted by the State Water Plan 14 outreach and education workgroup. Actually, 15 you're the Water Planning Council's outreach --16 DENISE SAVAGEAU: That's right. And we're --17 MARTIN HEFT: -- and work on the Water Plan. So 18 there's some little technical things like that, 19 that, you know, another set of eyes for us to 20 review and everything on that, that I would 21 appreciate in the future. 22 DENISE SAVAGEAU: Yes, and I -- and you're absolutely 23 correct. And that wasn't corrected because we 24 weren't sure if you were going to accept the 25 recommendations. That was the template we had

1 used when we were still the state water plan 2 implementation group, and that that is something 3 that we know that we needed to change after 4 today's meeting. 5 MARTIN HEFT: No, greatly appreciate it. Thank you. 6 DENISE SAVAGEAU: Thank you. 7 THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. Denise, thank you very much. 8 Appreciate it, all of your work. You always do a 9 great job. 10 Conservation Pricing Rate Recovery Analysis 11 workgroup. Alicea? 12 ALICEA CHARAMUT: I don't have an update. 13 But one thing that is missing -- and since 14 Denise was already up, the source water protection 15 workgroup isn't not on the list. 16 So if we want to add that, then I think they 17 do have a report. 18 THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. Who's doing that report? 19 DENISE SAVAGEAU: That's me. 20 THE CHAIRMAN: All right. Denise? 21 DENISE SAVAGEAU: Yeah. So the source water protection 22 workgroup is moving forward. We had some 23 challenges with some changes of staff earlier in 24 the year, but we are getting close to getting a 25 draft that's going to go out to the full Water

Planning Council advisory group, which will include the Water Planning Council. And we're hoping to have a draft for the Water Planning Council in October.

So that's our goal right now, is to have that, something that you guys can look at by then. But you'll be seeing it sooner than that. That's when we will officially, but we want to get feedback from the Water Planning Council advisory group. So we'll be sending that to them this month.

And our next meeting is on, I think, August 20th, if that's the Tuesday, and we continue to work on this. So we're making good progress. And hopefully we'll have this wrapped up this fall.

THE CHAIRMAN: Great, thank you so much.

Any questions for Denise? Eric had his hand up.

ERIC McPHEE: Just to catch me up and get me up to speed for the conservation pricing rate recovery analysis Workgroup, is there a defined goal or deliverable? Or is this just having a conversation on the topic?

ALICEA CHARAMUT: There is, and I will send you the proposal.

1 ERIC McPHEE: Thank you, Alicea. THE CHAIRMAN: Yeah, we've been working on that for a 2 3 while. We actually had a workshop on it a while 4 back, and we want to come up with some 5 recommendations moving forward, so. 6 ALICEA CHARAMUT: Yeah, it's stalled mostly because of 7 I need to get back to finding a better day 8 for the regular meetings. 9 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Alicea. 10 Watershed Lands Workgroup. 11 ALICEA CHARAMUT: I don't see --12 KATHY CZEPIEL: I am. 13 ALICEA CHARAMUT: Oh, Kathy, you're here. 14 KATHY CZEPIEL: Yeah, I am here. 15 We actually have not met since the last Water 16 Planning Council meeting. So we have nothing to 17 report, but our next meeting is on Friday, 18 September 13th. 19 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. 20 Interagency drought workgroup -- I don't 21 think we have a drought. Do we, Martin? 22 MARTIN HEFT: No. No, we do not. Things are good. 23 did have a meeting last month and reviewed 24 everything. The meeting for this Thursday is 25 canceled.

1 I know the agencies will be working on the 2 side, continuing just to do overviews and working 3 on our tabletop exercise, but we do not have a 4 meeting this month. 5 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Any questions for Martin? 6 7 (No response.) 8 9 THE CHAIRMAN: Any public -- I should have mentioned at 10 the beginning that my successor at the PURA will 11 be a former state representative, David Arconti 12 from Danbury. He started yesterday. 13 I didn't invite him to this meeting, but I 14 will invite him next month. I'm not sure if he 15 will be my successor on the Council, but he 16 certainly wants a -- I talked to him a little bit 17 about the Water Planning Council, and I certainly 18 update him. 19 So he, like I said, he started yesterday. 20 Any other public comment? Any other public 21 comment? 22 23 (No response.) 24 25 THE CHAIRMAN: If not, our next meeting will be

1	September 3rd, the day after Labor Day. I wish

3	Labor Day.
